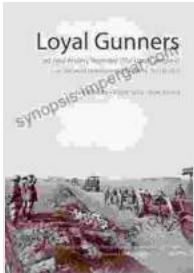

The History of New Brunswick

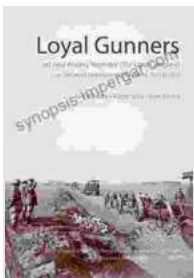
